June Monthly Tips

- Honey Flow begins winding down late June early July.
- Capped honey may be harvested and the empty frames returned to the hive.
- You can harvest when the honey is at least ¾ capped and passes a shake test.
- Add super if box is 75% full.
- Stay out of the brood box as much as possible. Disturbances during honey flow can reduce production
- Once you harvest your honey, be sure to feed heavily and put at least one super back onto the hive without the gueen excluder.
- Watch out for robbing!
- Do not medicate hives during honey flow
- Check for swarm and supersedure cells
- Check honey, pollen and brood pattern on frames
- Check for other pests (SHB, moths, roaches, ants), strong hives will keep pests in check.
- Keep your girls cool! Provide a close clean water source and ventilation.

- A few currently blooming nectar plants:
 - Vitex/Chaste Tree (Non-Native, Europe & Asia, Species: Viteks Agnus Castus)
 - o Crapemyrtle Tree (Non-Native, China, Species: Lagerstroemia Indica
 - Purple Prairie Clover (Native Perennial, Species: Dalea Purpurea Family: Fabaceae, Legume Family)
 - Green Milkweed (Native Perennial, Species: Asclepias viridis Family: Asclepiadaceae, Milkweed
 - o Take pictures of bees on nectar plants and email to janrhodson@gmail.com
- Handy Tips and Tools:
 - O Place your hive on a stand, 12-18in high.
 - A folding TV tray table will save your back.
 - Make your own screened inter-cover(s) this month. Install when it gets hot and humid at night. If you see a large number of bees hanging on the exterior of the hive they could use some ventilation.
 - Use a screened bottom board
 - Drill vent holes in new deep hive bodies. I use 5/8 in bits. I get corks for the winter at Hobby Lobby.
 - Use a journal
 - o Have a box/bucket handy to dispose of burr comb and debris
 - Use a quick 1/8" screen scrap to stop robbing
 - UK top feeders for winter
